

Career Videos

Career videos have been added to some occupational profiles on the Summary tab. The videos, produced by <u>CareerOneStop</u> 函, provide a brief overview of the occupation, including typical duties and entry-level education needed.

Navigating the OOH Homepage

There are several ways to find career information about a detailed occupation:

- Occupation Group Search. The OOH is broken up into clusters of similar occupation of interest on the left-hand side of the homepage. Clicking on a group results in a land summaries, typical entry-level education, and median pay. Typical entry-level education top of each column.
